








DRAWING & PAINTING



GLASS BLOWING WORKSHOP



Bob Johnson, Chair of Cushing's Fine Arts Department, recently took four students from his portfolio class to visit Terrapin Glass Blowing Studio in Jaffrey, N.H. Terrapin is a family-run studio that offers classes and private lessons in glass blowing. The students—Arkadiy Baltser '17, Cyvian Chen '16, Alex O'Neill '14, and Fiona Yang '16—all have an interest in pursuing visual arts majors in college. Besides wonderful pieces of art to add to their portfolios, the students also learned about teamwork because it takes three people to blow glass. 






PHOTOGRAPHY

THE ARTIST'S JOURNAL WORKSHOP

This winter term, Joan Hathaway led an afternoon activity called "The Artist's Journal Workshop." This new activity provided an opportunity for students to write as well as draw and create images. Such journals are powerful creative tools, offering students a place to experiment, explore, consider, and express. As part of the workshop, Tammy Ricker, a local artist, did a demonstration showing students how to make their own journals out of watercolor paper with leather covers. CERAMICS

Students interested in trying their hand at pottery and sculpture have the very best equipment and supplies at their fingertips in Cushing's ceramics studio. The studio offers nine wheels as well as a slab roller, an extruder, and several kilns, both electric and raku. The large space provides plenty of room for instruction as well as independent work.




ARCHITECTURE

Clayton Sandage '14

Clayton Sandage has liked creating art since he was very young. When he came to Cushing, however, he found a new passion in metalsmithing. "I love making things with my hands," he says."Sometimes it can be frustrating when a piece falls apart or a piece melts incorrectly, but where would the fun be in making a cool piece if it was easy?"

For Clayton, metalsmithing is not just another class in the long academic day. It is part of his whole Cushing experience and is something he does both in class and during his free time. "Whether it is making jump-rings in my room or coming up with new ideas in the studio, " he says, "I am glad that the time put into my work leads to pieces that will be enjoyed by someone else."

Young Ah Kim '14

Young Ah Kim has liked visual arts since she was quite young, especially classic oil paintings by the Old Masters. "I aspired to create art pieces," she says, "but it was hard to explore my talents until I came to Cushing, where I was provided with time and instruction I needed to improve my skills."

Young Ah enjoys creating oil paintings and occasionally pencil drawings and opaque watercolor, because they allow her to express solid, precise images. Creating art gives her the opportunity to express herself in ways that can be difficult in other mediums. "Art mimics the world we live in, but at the same time it creates something more than the natural world," she says. "That is the reason I love art. By looking at a two-dimensional canvas that was once a blank paper, one can listen to stories that range from fantasy novels and historical documents to a simple page of someone's diary."



Seungyong "Sean" Kim '14

As a portfolio student, Korean native Seungyong Kim spends much of his free time working on his pottery. "I do pottery because I love it," he says. "I put in time to make a pot because I know that I'm not going to be here next year, and I know that I will not have this lovely workshop in my future."

Creating pottery is not always easy, but it is a wonderful learning experience. "Can you imagine excitedly opening the kiln to admire the teapot that you had worked on for a week and half, only to discover it had a cracked bottom? I have produced several cracked pieces over the past three years. Yet, each fractured work has made me reflect on my process and ask myself what I did wrong."

His teachers encourage his ideas and share their own and he knows he's supported to create whatever he can imagine. "Our art program is that amazing," he says.





Christine Bonetti '14

When Christine Bonetti came to Cushing, she'd never taken an actual painting class, despite the fact that that she'd always enjoyed painting and drawing. She assumed that she would never be as good as her peers, who had been taking classes for several years. After coming to Cushing, however, she decided to take Mr. Johnson's class and it's turned out to be a good choice for the young artist. "In the beginning I had a difficult time finding my place because the rest of class was so experienced," she says. "But with help from Mr. Johnson, I have gained some confidence in my paintings and developed a passion for watercolor." She will continue painting in college.

Amelia is in her second year at Cushing and was a beginner when she came. Today, she is thriving in the advanced metalsmithing class. In her time at the Academy, she has learned how to come up with her own ideas and about the work that goes into creating works of art. "I have learned about the science behind the process and how to think creatively and strategically," she says.

Her metalsmithing classes have taught life skills too. She's learned to work hard, how to plan, and how to make something work even if it goes wrong. And, she knows how lucky she's been to work with Mr. Johnson and Ms. Gardner. "I feel so honored to have been part of the art department at Cushing because it taught me skills that will help me throughout the rest of my life." She plans to attend Appalachian State University and minor in studio art.




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
